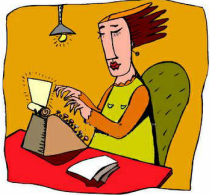

How the church used to look inside (1938)

A BIT OF ST. OSWALD'S HISTORY

St Oswald's was built in 1937 to serve the rapidly expanding housing north of "old" Croxley Green, and was designed as a dual purpose building, acting as both a church and a hall. It was divided at the chancel by wooden screens, which were removed for Sundays so the whole building became the church; these were replaced for Monday, when the chairs were moved to the side, and the hall section used for other activities - during the war mainly as an infant school, which later became the nearby Malvern Way School. Shown here is how the interior looked in 1938, although nowadays the choir seating is rather more comfortable! Why not come and visit us one Sunday? Services are at 8 and 10 am.

CHENIES MANOR

We had been meaning to visit Chenies Manor for some time, but it is not open every day (check opening times). On Easter Monday when the weather was glorious we noticed it was open and so with a group of friends we went on a tour of the Manor. Chenies is mentioned in 1321, properties were noted on the land, even as early as 1180. The area was known then as Isenhampstead Chenies. The Cheynes owned the land in 1316, the land was passed down the line until around 1498. Eventually Lord John Russell was the owner (1534). John Russell later the Earl of Bedford was a favourite of King Henry VIII. Henry stayed at Chenies with his young wife Catherine Howard. Francis, the second Earl of Bedford entertained Queen Elizabeth I at Chenies. The Court would leave London during the summer months and stay in the country away from the plague. Elizabeth was at Chenies on 19th July 1570 and again in



August 1576. There is an ancient oak tree in the grounds which she is said to like sitting under.

The Manor still has many Tudor features, it is a good example of the early use of brick in the County. The windows are original and the 22 chimney stacks have elaborate patterned cut brick. It still has Tudor panelling inside the house and many more original features can be seen on a short interesting tour. The gardens are lovely and obviously as the summer arrives and everything is in full bloom

will be enchanting. The house has been owned only by a few families during its long history and in 1950 was bought by the present owners Alistair and Elizabeth Macleod Matthews. It is their hard work, which is ongoing, that has preserved this lovely Tudor Manor so close to where we live.

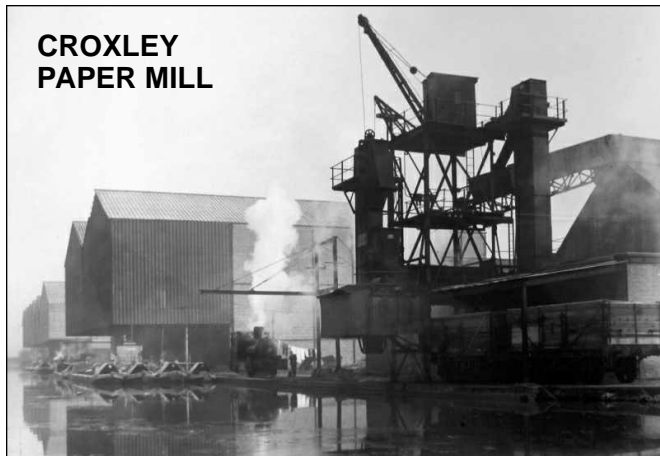
Well done to the intrepid group but a note to everyone please remember to keep Byewaters tidy. Thank you to all those that worked so hard.

The Croxley Revels is one of the country's largest traditional summer village fayres (held annually on the afternoon of the Saturday closest to summer solstice) which attracts thousands of revellers..... and entrance is FREE!

The Revels site incorporates virtually the whole of The Green and is set up during the early morning by a large group of enthusiastic local residents. There will be almost 100 stalls, an arena that stages all manner of entertainment with activities from judo exhibitions to performing dogs and Maypole dancing. The Revels Princess will be paraded in the grand procession around the village. Periphery interests include a children's funfair; bouncy castle, bungee football, storytelling, Punch & Judy, Stilt Walking, Magic, Juggling and roving entertainments. All the fun of the fair! As people roam the Revels site they will be exposed to stalls and entertainments run by local clubs, societies, organisations and businesses. The grand finale will be, of course, the World famous school's Pushball tournament!

Neighbourhood Watch

Protect your phone, tablet or other mobile device

Not only are our mobile phones and other mobile devices valuable in themselves, but many of them also contain valuable data, including personal information. As a result, they can be a very tempting target for thieves. Many mobile devices now have tracking and other security features available. These 'apps' make it possible to locate and recover lost or stolen devices using a GPS signal and even catch criminals before they can dispose of stolen items. Recently, a number of stolen mobile devices have been successfully located and recovered by police in Hertfordshire, thanks to the tracking applications installed on them. Some also led to the arrest of the thief or handler of stolen goods. There are a number of suitable tracking apps available for Android, Apple and other devices, which are easy to download and usually free.

More information can be found at: www.police.uk/crime-prevention-advice/protecting-your-mobile-phone/. If your device with an 'app' installed has been lost, you can locate and collect it yourself. If your device is stolen or if you trace a lost device to a place you have not been, or if you have other concerns, it is strongly recommended to contact police rather than try to recover it yourself, as this could place you in a difficult or even dangerous situation. You should contact police as soon as possible, as they may be able to track the device, recover it and make an arrest. **Tips to help protect your mobile devices:** - 1. Only use apps from your accredited app store, look for those with good ratings and feedback. 2. Some devices have tracking apps pre-loaded but may need activating. 3. Always lock your device when not in use. 4. Use your device discreetly in public places. 5. Never leave devices on tables in cafes, pubs etc. or on display in the car. 6. GO SLOW – NOW!! Don't be the cause of an accident – reduce your speed to 20mph or less !!



As summer is just around the corner and families will be walking around Byewaters enjoying the lovely surroundings, please can you keep your speeds down 20mph or less would be best. There are lots of blind spots mainly caused by parked cars, some of which are parked on the pavement. Parking two wheels on the pavement is having to be accepted but not all four wheels. This can cause an accident as pedestrians will have to walk in the road, especially if they are pushing a buggy or wheelchair. Please think of others and try not to park on pavements or on blind spots. (Parking large vehicles on or close to corners is not advisable and can also be the cause of an accident.) If your car damages a pavement you will have to be charged for the repair. Please always think of others when driving and parking around Byewaters.

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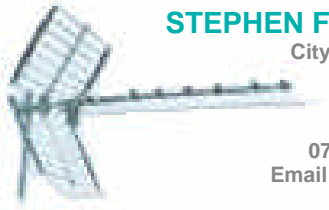
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
